National Origin

The Church of God by Faith, Inc. began in 1914 under the leadership of devout men



and women in Jacksonville, Florida. These men and women were inspired by God and founded the first church in Jacksonville, Florida. The founders include Elder Crawford Bright, Elder John Bright, Bishop Aaron Matthews, Elder Nathaniel Scippio, Mother Delia Roundtree, and others. Later, Elder Herbert Steadman became the first executive secretary and editor for the Sunday School literature and various inspirational publications.

The founders' purpose for the church is to glorify God in the beauty of holiness. The first Assembly Meeting was held in 1917 in White Springs, Florida. Missions were set up in various places, Palatka was known as the headquarters of the group in 1919. In 1919, the Church of God by Faith concept was drafted.

The General Assembly was moved from Alachua, Florida in December of 1941. The first officers were Elder John Bright, Moderator; Elder Aaron Matthews,

Bishop; Elder Nathaniel Scippio, First National Evangelist; and Elder Hubert Steadman, Executive Secretary.


Elder John Bright - Founder




Elder John Bright, one of the founders, was saved under the preaching of Elder Fox Thompson in 1912. He was affectionately known as "Daddy Bright". Daddy Bright served as the first District Elder of the Jacksonville District. He was

also the Moderator of the Church of God by Faith, Inc. His favorite song was "I'm Happy with Jesus, Alone". God called Elder Bright to a

resting place in 1958. Often times, he is pictured by the first Church of God by Faith which was built in Jacksonville, Florida.



Bishop Aaron Matthews – First Bishop and Founder



Bishop Aaron Matthews was the first Bishop of the Church of God by Faith and one of the first Council Member. He was saved in 1913 and served as the first District Elder of the Ocala District, Ocala, Florida. Bishop was married to the lovely Mother Nancy Matthews, a woman of faith, and who inspired other women of faith to live godly lives reflective of home preparations and good housekeeping. His favorite song was "Bread of Heaven". He was known as the "Walking Bible'. With a nub finger and one lung, he preached mightily as the Lord inspired him to share His Word. Bishop Matthews lived in the "Big House" and

many people were taken there for prayer and recovered from their illnesses. In 1959, the Church mourned the passing of Bishop Aaron Matthews.

Elder Nathaniel was the first Evangelist, and one of the first members. He was brother-in-law of

Aaron Matthews. He was married to Mother Essie Scippio, his traveling and

missionary companion. Elder Scippio established 23 churches. He and Mother Scippio traveled with a unique mobile vehicle that was used in various mission endeavors. He used a megaphone and traveled through neighborhoods crying, "Heaven or Hell". He used the gift of discernment mightily as he called many on their behavior. His favorite song was "I'm stepping out on Jesus". Often times, Elder Scippio used the "N" word in his messages.

Mother Delia Scippio supported her husband and they served God traveling to various areas of the East coast.




Elder Hubert Steadman





Elder Willie W. Billups and Mother Emma Billups

Founder of the South Carolina District. Built the first church in 1931 under the leadership of Elder Nathaniel Scippio- Overseer. Elder Billups was the first Superintendent of the South Carolina District. According to his grandson, Bro. James Lonon, Elder Scippio and Elder Nathaniel Scippio were social buddies. His ministry span from 1927 -



Elder Nathaniel Scippio evangelized South Carolina primarily in Sumter and Lee Counties. Elder Scippio has received credit for building Sumter No. 1 on Beck Street, Sumter No. 2 on Guignard St., and Pinewood Church located in Pinewood South Carolina. It is safe to say that Sumter No. 1 was built by Elder Willie Billups under the leadership and guidance of Elder Scippio. Bro. James Lonon, grandson of Elder Billups and Sis Martha Stukes, daughter of Mother Eva Stukes, the first SC Convert both concur.

Elder Kemp has the longest tenure as District Elder – 23 years. God wrought many miracles through him such as stopping the rain from interrupting an outdoor service at Davis Station and raising the deceased on four different occasions.

South Carolina's Beginnings



The South Carolina District had its beginning between 1927 - 1928 when Elder Willie and Mother Emma Billups returned to Sumter from Florida. While in Florida, the Billups received the Lord as their Savior and brought the good news of the Gospel to South Carolina. Shortly after the return of the Billups, Elder Billups pitched a tent and began to evangelize. Many people were saved and healed.



Mother Eva Stukes was the first convert during that time. Daddy Naham McBride remembers visiting the tent when he was a very young child. The tent was located on the Bennet Hamilton property (The Tram Road), near an area known as Brogden, SC. He recalls seeing Mother

Stukes, Mother Matilda Allen and the Billups having service under the tent. As providence would have it, Daddy Naham McBride received the

Lord years later at the age of 26. The tent was moved to the city of Sumter, near the Jehovah Baptist church. Elder



Nathaniel Scippio came Sumter and continued revivals people harvesting into the Kingdom and teamed up with Elder Billups. Elder Scippio led many to salvation. During that time Elder Arthur Dukes, Mother Ellen McCastle, Mother Susan Allen. Mother Willie Balls. Mother Helen Matthews. and many more accepted their salvation. The first church was built in 1931 on Beck Street under



the direction of Elder Willie Billups.

Elder Griffin Kemp was sent to pastor Sumter No. 1 and also served as district elder in 1937. Elder Kemp and Sister Daisy Kemp worked very tenaciously inspiring the community. The district continued to grow in membership and extended to other areas of Sumter, (Sumter No. 2 was born) St. Paul, Davis Station, Pinewood, Atkins, Florence, and Summerton during Elder Kemp's administration. (During the Administration of Elder W.H. Livingston, the Church at Atkins was moved to Lynchburg.)

Elder Kemp was a member of the first latter Council. Prior to coming to South Carolina, he served as the first District Elder of the Gainesville District. He was a member of the Advisory Board of the first Assembly in Sumter, South Carolina. Elder Kemp rarely preached longer than 15 minutes but with a powerful voice that delivered the Word. When he used the word "hallelujah" it was so powerful that people fell out under the Spirit. He was married to Mother Daisy Kemp. Elder Kemp was the father of three children *** (2 sons – Rufus and , and a daughter) and a step-daughter (Martha). He loved the children and always gave them "hot balls" (candy). He was a "people person" and inspired other ministers from other denominations in their ministries. Elder Kemp used his carpentry skills to assist his members in building and repairs their homes. Prior to his death, the saints gathered around his bed, praying for his healing and survival until he asked to them to stop praying. Min. D.Y. McBride remembered getting him a drink of water. Elder Kemp was called home in 1959; he had a gangrene infection.

The Church at North, Congruity, Orangeburg, and Pelion were established later. Amelia, Virginia was inherited from the Northeastern District. Various missions were established as well to include Spartanburg, Bishopville, Olanta, Elliott, and Faith Outreach Center.



The church at Sumter had its beginning between 1927 - 1928 when Elder Willie and Mother Emma Jane Billups returned to Sumter from Florida. While in Florida, the Billups received the Lord as their Savior and brought the good news of the Gospel to South Carolina. Shortly after the return of the Billups, Elder Billups pitched a tent and began to evangelize. Many people were saved and

healed. Mother Eva Stukes was the first convert during that time. Daddy Naham McBride remembers visiting the tent when he was a very young child. The tent was

at the age of 26. Elder Nathaniel Scippio, friend of Elder Billups came to Sumter to assist in the soul winning efforts and pitched the tent in city of Sumter, near the Jehovah Baptist church. Elder Nathaniel Scippio came and continued revivals harvesting people into the Kingdom. Individuals such as Mother McCastle, Mother Susan Allen, Mother Willie Balls, Mother Helen Matthews, Mother Stella Mark, Mother Irene Lewis, Mother McWillie Hudson, and many more accepted their salvation. The first church was built in 1931 on Beck Street by and under the leadership of Elder Willie Billups as indicated by Bro. James Lonon, grandson of Elder Billups and Deaconess Martha Stukes, daughter of the first convert, Mother Eva Stukes. Perhaps it is safe to say that Elder Scippio was the Overseer of the work.



Elder Griffin Kemp was sent to pastor and also served as district elder in 1937. Elder Kemp and Sister Daisy Kemp worked very tenaciously inspiring the community. The church continued to grow in membership and outgrew the building on Beck Street. The second church was erected on Shannon Avenue about 1939. The Beck Street Church then became a parsonage. Below Elder Griffin Kemp is pictured in



the center, Sis. Daisy Kemp is to his right, Mother Willie Ball is right of Sis Kemp, Sis. Matilda Allen is sitting directly behind Mother Ball. Mother Stukes and Deacon Linton are behind Mother Allen.

Around 1961, Elder Arthur Dukes, the fire ball preacher who was notorious for his biblical recitations, became the pastor. Elder Dukes and his wife, sister Minnie Dukes, served

faithfully for about two years.

In 1973 our present church (located at 609 Atlantic Avenue) was built and dedicated under the pastoral leadership of Elder Senior Lewis. Sister Ruth Nell Lewis worked faithfully with him. Elder Lewis was a praying man who held early Saturday morning prayer service.

He also ran revival lengthy revivals as long as six weeks.

In 1975 Elder William Henry Livingston, Sr. (Sister Viola), pastored our church as



well as served as District Elder. Deacon David Canty used Deacon Naham McBride's house plan and constructed the parsonage located at 607 Atlantic Avenue during the 70's. The house has since been converted into the SC District Headquarters. Elder Livingston was indeed a people's person who enjoyed playing his guitar with his sons.

In 1980 became Jones' growth Graham Elder assisted Elder the Jones

Elder E.P. Livingston (Sister Willer-Dean) began his tenure in June of 1986. The church continued to grow in membership and changes to the original structure were done. New windows and ceiling fixtures were added to the Sanctuary providing an inviting atmosphere. Modification to the parsonage was done. In February 2002, Elder Livingston went to be with the Lord. Elder Thomas Gibbs (Sis. Casondra) served as interim pastor until June 2002.





In 2002 Elder Mack S. Wilson was appointed District Elder. For the first time in our history, a District Elder did not pastor "the Home Church" in Sumter. Elder Wilson chose to continue his pastorate at "God's Remedy COGBF in Florence, SC. The SC District continues to grow with the vision our Elder Wilson. Under his administration, the District was organized into regions to include: the Pee Dee Virginia Region,

the Clarendon/Lee Progressive Region, and the Orangeburg-Midlands Region. A District Headquarters Office was established (a first throughout the organization), a Ministry Training Committee was appointed, A Technical Team was organized whose work created a Web presence headed and maintained by Min. D.Y.

In July of 2002, Elder Lucas was appointed by the Executive Council to pastor, Sumter No. 1 where he is presently serving. During his pastorate at Sumter, No. 1, the church purchased a new organ Leslies, upgraded the PA system, purchased a new church sign, renovated the sanctuary to include new chandeliers and upholstered pews. In addition, choir chairs were purchased and the pews were upgraded

with bible holders. Currently, the building fund is increasing and through his vision and the efforts of the members, the sanctuary was modified and the fellowship/kitchen facility. A new roof was added to the church and repairs to the ceilings in 2014. Everything Elder Lucas has accomplished during his ministry, he accredits to God and the support of his wife, First Lady, Sister Alice Lucas, his

children and many encouraging saints. Elder Lucas teaches faith, sound doctrine, and believes that with God all things are possible.

According to National History, Elder Scippio built the church around 1932. The church was located on Guignard Street in Sumter, South Carolina. Elder Arthur Dukes served as pastor for many years until around about 1959 when the church was destroyed by a storm. Members of Sumter No. 2 joined Sumter No. 1. These members included: Mother Vernell Sanders, Mother Ford, Deacon Lucius and Mother Rosa Brown, Deacon Frank Green, Mother Minnie Brooks, Sis. Johnson. The saints of Sumter No. 1 look forward to visiting their sister church and vice-versa.

Mother Vernell Sanders was ill with diabetes and one day she developed gangrene and an amputation was necessary. Mother Sanders exercised her faith, kept her leg, lived to give her testimony of God's healing power and died years later with both legs.

Lynchburg – 1934 Contributing Writers: Elder Andre' McBride, Superintendent Mack S. Wilson

Elder Scippio and missionaries in Atkins, SC community conducted an old-time camp meeting during 1934. The year of 1934 brought contentment and salvation to many residents of the Atkins community. Elder Billups was left in charge after the revival to organize the church.

The church continued to progress under the pastorate of Elder L. Worthy, Elder Arthur Dukes, Elder Willie Clark and Elder James Lucas.

During Elder William H. Livingston's tenure, around 1978, land was purchased in Lynchburg with the assistance of the late Deacon Henry Davis, Sr. (Who held "the Thousand Dollar Program") and the late Deacon Jeff Rouse (Who found the land). The ground breaking ceremony was held and funds were raised for the construction of a new building. Initial construction of the COGBF Lynchburg was done by Elder W.H. Livingston, Elder Richard Jones and various brethren on the district.

While the church was not yet complete, Elder Arthur Dukes was the pastor or newly



relocated Lynchburg COGBF and Minister Livingston and Minister Robert Melton assisted him. Under Elder Dukes' ministry a lot souls were saved and added to the Lynchburg church to include Mack S. Wilson, Gloria R. Wilson and many of the Davis children. Elder Wilson recalls, many were saved during Thursday Night Bible Study as he was one of them. Elder Dukes did a lot for the spiritual

Five ministers were born under C.P. McBride's pastorate; Minister James Windham, Minister Mack Wilson, Minister Phares McBride, Minister Andre' McBride (appointed Associate Pastor of COGBF, Lynchburg at the 2001 December General Assembly, and Minister Michael Fullard.



Elder James Taylor Author Dukes, Elder Chester, Elder Worthy, Elder David Laws Sr., Elder David McBride, Elder David Davis, Elder CP McBride, and Elder James Taylor.

Some of the members were Deacon Moise Brunson, Deacon Riley and family, the Ragin family, the Johnson family, Mother Mary Robinson and family, and Mother V. McBride. Members included Deacon Snyder, Deacon Riley, Deacon Willie Davis, Mother Emma Davis, and Sister B. Davis.

Elder John Spry served as pastor at the Summerton and St. Paul Church of God By Faith, Inc. for several years. Summerton Church of God By Faith, Summerton, South Carolina, South Carolina had Deacon Moise Brunson and Deacon Acie Riley and Mother Alice Riley and Mother Robinson were mothers of the church.

In December of 2006, Elder Mack S. Wilson appointed Minister George Marion Boatwright as Associate Minister. Minister George and Audrey Boatwright served faithfully as Associate Minister. Minister George M. Boatwright and family continued to serve faithfully and were appointed by Bishop McKnight as the Pastor of Macedonia COGBF, Inc. in December 2008.

Pastor Boatwright and his wife continue to build on the foundation set before them

by the many Elders, serving at Macedonia. They continue to improve the sanctuary by sacrificing funds for various donations: Chairs for the pulpit, tables, Church sign, drums, and the van ministry. The church has purchased: central air and heat unit, guitars, amplifiers, speakers, microphones, keyboard, and conga drums, etc.





Eva Stukes, Deacon Naham and Mother Vashti McBride. Sis Pauline Montgomery's husband Bro George Montgomery was ill and she requested prayer for him to be healed. Sis Montgomery had a cousin which she visited, Sis Harriett Taylor, who was a member of Sumter No 1. Church of God by Faith, Inc. Sis Taylor requested the five church members aforementioned to come and have prayer for her husband who God healed and Holy Ghost sanctified. The surrounding community heard of the Bro Montgomery was healed and Holy Ghost filled and the people wanted to be in prayer and Holy Ghost sanctified prayer services which were held in Bro and Sis Montgomery's home until the house was overflowed with people.

The services were moved under a large oak tree in their yard which was located on the Davis Station Road. Elder Griffin Kemp was the District Leader and pastor of Sumter No. 1 Church of God By Faith, Inc. Sumter, South Carolina. Elder Kemp had gone to Rochester, New York to visit his brother, Elder Eugene Kemp.

When he returned and heard that people came to the Holy Ghost prayer and healing services and many were deliverance from their sins and healed. Elder Kemp established a tent which was placed under the oak tree and people continued to come to the services. God knew it was time for Elder Kemp and Church members to have a building to worship, have service and praise God. They were blessed to purchase a school house.

In 1955, Bro George Montgomery knew Elder John W. Spry as a pastor at Triumph - The Church and Kingdom Of God In Christ, Davis Station, South Carolina. Elder

Spry served several years until Bro Montgomery told Elder Kemp about Elder John W. Spry a man of compassion, character and integrity. During that year Elder Kemp appointed Elder John Wesley Spry pastor of Davis Station Church of God by Faith. Elder Spry recognized that the church building needed several repairs and equipment which he donated his time and equipment to complete these task. Elder Spry was a gifted and skilled builder, bricklayer and with









excellent business skills. Elder Spry built a house for Deacon George and Mother

Pauline and daughter Mary Montgomery, the first deacon of the church. Elder Spry renovated a section of the church to house the eldest Mother Nell Gibson. Elder John W. Mother Hattie L. Spry and their children took church members home, purchased food, and gave food from the Spry's farm to feed the needed, buy clothes, cut wood for the church heater. In addition, they took church members home after service. Elder John W. Spry also pastored Summerton and St Paul church of God By Faith Inc., for several years due to former pastors' critical family and job issues. Church members, friends and community people called Elder Griffin Kemp.

Elder Kemp visited Elder Spry sometimes twice a week which Sis Gertrude Balls McBride was his driver and sometimes Sis Julia Mae Amos. Elder Spry gave them vegetables, fruits and nuts from his farm. When Elder Spry and family member were not home Elder Kemp and church member of the district would go to the garden or field pick vegetables or fruits.

Elder John W. Spry appointed Deacon George Montgomery first deacon and Deacon Henry Hilton, Deacon Lee McCray and selected Mother Lillie Ann Pearson and Mother Nell Gibson as mothers during his pastoral. Elder John W. Spry served as pastor of the Davis Station Church of God By Faith, Davis Station until his death January 1962.

After Elder John W. Spry's death, Mother Hattie Simon Spry continue to as Acting

Pastor for several months until Mother Spry made request to Elder Walter Rosier to provide the church with a pastor. Elder Walter Rosier requested Minister James Taylor a young, devout, and faithful man in his first pastoral church. Mother Spry stated to Elder Rosier that Elder Taylor needed several pastoral credentials. Elder Rosier provided Elder Taylor with pastoral certificate.

Elder John W. Spry encouraged the Black people community and surround area when land become available and being offer to sell take the opportunity to purchase

Elder Arthur Dukes came and pastored for several months.

Elder Taylor served faithfully, preached sound doctrine and caring for the church

member and being a dedicated shepherd to his flock. Elder Taylor was mentor for Sis Helen Doughty and three children he purchased clothes for her two sons. Elder Taylor reconstructed the school building to a church with aid of the deacons and church members. Deacons who served during Elder Taylor leadership were Deacon Lee McCray, Deacon



Moses McDuffie and Deacon Richmond McDuffie. When we had our 1969

October Assembly the Bishop appointed Elder Taylor to pastor another church.

In 1969 Elder C.P. McBride was appointed by the Executive Council with the presiding Bishop W.W. Matthews to be the pastor of Davis Station Church of God by Faith, Inc. Elder C.P.

Elder C.P. McBride Lady Gertrude McBride were enthusiastic and grateful to embark upon building a new sanctuary. They worked faithfully along with the church members until the new church was built in April 1971. During Elder



Wayne (Sis. Pamela) Brunson was appointed to serve. On the 2nd Sunday District Elder (Mother W.D.) Livingston served. On the 3rd Sunday the congregation served. On the 4th Sunday Min. Donnie (Evang. JoAnn) Brown served.

In the year **1997**, the construction began on the new sanctuary.



In the year **1998**, Dea. Bobbie Hartwell went home to be with the Lord. After being ordained during the National Convention – Min. Wayne (Sis. Pamela) Brunson was appointed as pastor and wife by the executive council.

In the years **1999-2000**, under their leadership and husband and wife ministry of "<u>Hope</u>, <u>Praise and Consolation</u>" the vision started to come to pass in full

circle – more members joined and souls were saved.

In the year **2001**, Min. Brunson received a vision from the Lord to add a prefix "Power House" to the organization name and after completing the necessary paperwork resulted in Power House Church of God by Faith, Pelion, SC.

In the year **2002**, District Elder Livingston went home to be with the Lord. Also, that year, Min. Brunson was consecrated as "Elder" during the National Convention.

In the years **2003-2009**, the Lord continued to send members, families, and covenant partners to Pelion and wrought miracles and blessings before our eyes. That same year Pelion was recognized as a "church" denouncing "mission" status.

In the year **2010**, Bro. Frank Hartwell went home to be with the Lord. This was our 2nd active member to pass away in (14) years. Also, Elect Lady Brunson and Sister JoAnn Brown were consecrated as "Evangelist" during the Summer Convention.

In the years **2011-2012**, more members continued to join the church and the ministerial staff was formed. We know without a doubt the Lord has His hands upon this bethel spot and has birth several ministries within the church to accommodate the people that He is sending for kingdom work. We are currently raising funds for our addition which we decree will be so in Jesus name.

In the year **2013**, the Lord just keeps proving Himself to Power House by the out pouring of His anointing, reclaiming back-sliders and the saving of souls!!! Also July of that year, the Executive Council approved Elder Wayne (Evang. Pamela) Brunson to become pastor of our sister church in Newark, NJ, while still pastoring

Columbia – Shekinah Glory

During the late '70s and'80s, Evangelist Thomas Davis dedicated a mission in Columbia, SC. Initially the Mission was located off of Monticello Drive. During this time, Deacon Buster and Sister Runell Eady and children, Brother Antonio McKie, Sister Jackie Gibbs McKie, Brother Leroy Gibbs, Sister Cheryl McKie, Mother McKie, and Sister Faith McBride Kemp and children worked tenaciously to assist Elder Davis in



proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The mission was located between North Main St. and Farrow Road near Columbia College Drive. The mission was later closed.

In 1994, Elder David Lucas requested to Elder E.P. Livingston to reopen the Mission in Columbia, South Carolina. Elder Livingston consented to the reopening of the Mission. Elder David and Lady Mabel Lucas, Bro. William Livingston and family, Sister Yvonne Riggins, Brother Tyrone Balls, and Sister Deloris Yvonne McBride worked together in the most harmonious manner sharing and communicating the Gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. During this time, the mission purchased a van to assist in the mission work. Services were held in a storefront on Fairfield Road in Columbia, SC.

Elder Lucas was appointed to the church in North, South Carolina in 1995. In 1995, Elder James Gibbs served for approximately a year. The Mission continued under the supervision of Elder Lucas with the assistance of the congregation. In 1996, Minister Phares (Lady Melissa) McBride served as pastor for nearly a year. The Word was proclaimed and others were added to the mission work. 1998 brought Minister Herd (and his wife) to pastoral duties. During this time the congregation held services in the home of Evangelist Yvonne Riggins. In 2000, Minister Elder Donnie Brown and Evangelist JoAnn Brown carried out the work of the mission. Their faithful service lasted until Minister Mabel Lucas continued to serve the mission while her husband continued pastoring in North, SC. In 2001, Elder Lucas asked Evangelist Loretha Jackson to continue the work of the mission. There were several attempts to secure a place for worship and the congregation moved to a funeral home to held services.

In 2003, District Elder Mack S. Wilson asked Elder Antonio McKie to serve the mission. Columbia Mission under his tenure, the congregation left the funeral home and began worship services at the Adams Mark Hotel located downtown Columbia. Elder Antonio and Sister Jackie McKie worked faithfully until 2004. The mission was named Shekinah Glory by Elder McKie.

In July 2004, the mission was under the direction of the District Elder. The congregation relocated to the Best Western Hotel to hold services until the building at 2009 Leesburg Road was leased to hold services. In December 2004, Elder Andre' McBride was appointed pastor and elder David Laws assisted as pastor. They along with their wives and families worked diligently in reaching the lost and

Minister Naham McBride and wife Sister Joyce McBride along with other ministers and wives assisted in the ministry as well.



TO RECOGNIZE AND COMMEND THE CHURCH OF GOD BY FAITH, INC. FOR HELPING OTHERS TO SEEK THE BLESSINGS OFFERED TO CHRISTIANS AND TO CONGRATULATE THE CHURCH MEMBERS EVERYWHERE UPON THE CELEBRATION OF THEIR ONE HUNDREDTH ANNIVERSARY.

Whereas, the members of the South Carolina House of Representatives are pleased to learn that the Church of God by Faith, Inc. will celebrate its centennial anniversary in Columbia from July 24 through July 27, 2014; and

Whereas, founders Crawford Bright, Elder John Bright, Nathaniel Scippio, and Aaron Matthews, Sr., created the Church of God by Faith, Inc. in 1914 in Jacksonville, Florida, for the purpose of glorifying God "in the beauty of holiness"; and

Whereas, the first executive secretary of the church, Hubert Steadman, served as the editor for the Sunday school literature and various inspirational publications; and

Whereas, the bonds formed through the establishment of the Church of God by Faith served to encourage believers and unify, sustain, strengthen, spiritually grow, and educate them in the Word of God in an environment where the Spirit of Christ is active; and

Whereas, the name "Church of God" gives glory to the Lord, which is due His name, and "faith" signifies the means of trust, confidence, reliability, and steadfastness that the founders placed in the unseen power of God without reservation; and

Whereas, the South Carolina District began between 1927 and 1928 when Elder Willie and Mother Emma Billups returned to Sumter from Florida, bringing the good news of the Gospel; and

Whereas, shortly after their return, Elder Billups began to evangelize under a pitched tent on the Bennet Hamilton land near Brogden, resulting in salvation and healing for many people; and

Whereas, Mother Eva Stukes was the first convert, and others were added until the tent was moved within the City of Sumter. Elder Billups and Elder Nathaniel Scippio, who came to Sumter, preached revivals and led new believers into the Kingdom; and

Whereas, under the leadership of Elder Billups, the first church was built on Beck Street in 1931, and in 1937, Elder Griffin Kemp came to serve as pastor and District Elder, adding churches in St. Paul, Davis Station, Pinewood, Atkins, Florence, and Summerton; and

Whereas, the Church of God by Faith has now extended to Lynchburg, North, Columbia, Gable, Orangeburg, and Pelion, and outreach areas include Richmond and Amelia, Virginia; and

Whereas, the leaders of the South District have included Elders Willie Billups, Griffin Kemp, Walter Rosier, Arthur Dukes, Senior Lewis, W. H. Livingston, Richard Jones, E. P. Livingston,

and Mack S. Wilson, and currently the South Carolina District is led by Bishop James E. McKnight; and

Whereas, the South Carolina House of Representatives appreciates the outstanding service that Church of God by Faith has provided for ten decades to citizens of the Palmetto State and looks to hear of its continued ministry in the coming century. Now, therefore,
